Welcome to the Vital Spark Symposium. The Spark has invested considerable resource over the last 5 years in the Vital Spark movement thanks to Arts Council England investment as a National Portfolio Organisation. We continue to provide a nationally significant programme that addresses the lack of diversity in the Performance for Young Audiences (PYA) sector.

We've made great strides, but there is so much more to do... and with your help here, over these two days we'll all make the sector stronger.

You only have to look at the press, talk to that friend who's funding bid was unsuccessful or chat to a colleague over a breaktime cuppa to recognise that the landscape for artists and organisations continues to grow more challenging. Here at The Spark we are committed to making the PYA sector more relevant and inclusive – and Vital Spark is at the heart of that nationally and internationally.

We're all operating in a Volatile, Uncertain, Complex and Ambiguous (VUCA) landscape. Whether that's increased costs, local authority cuts or the competition for funds from trusts and foundations. The impact is real for organisations big or small and artists emerging and established. I'd pose that its affecting everyone at a scale comparable to their size. Some might say the pressures are the same – just with a few more or less zeros on the balance sheet.

But of course, the impact of that balance sheet is affecting freelance artists the most. When it's hand to mouth – quite literally, how do you sustain your practise when you need to pay the bills? And what are organisations doing to sustain artists? Not just the transactional paying of invoices, but relationally driving the artistic ecosystem, through investing in care, development and professional growth.

We're all here because we care. We care about performance for young audiences. We care about artists. We care about the future of our sector as a whole and the part Performance for Young Audience plays in the wider theatre ecology.

But in a climate where caring costs more, and the money feels less and less- how can we come together to address the challenges and find a way forward to benefit the people that need the work most – children. After all those audiences of TODAY and NOW are who we are serving.

So, we're inviting you to take some time, be brave, take courage, pass that courage on to others you meet here and find new allies on your journey. And with that, through collective commitment to action, we can ride the current storm and find a way of continuing to make the Performance for Young Audiences sector as relevant and inclusive as it should be.
